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### **SECTION 1: OUR SCHOOLS**

The City of Cambridge, in partnership with the Cambridge City School District, is updating and redeveloping a School Travel Plan for students attending the local schools. In 2004, the school district consolidated most schools onto a campus on the northern, less-dense edge of the city. Cambridge Primary School remains in a high-density residential neighborhood that encompasses most of the city, north of Wheeling Avenue (US 22/40).

This updated School Travel Plan builds upon the previous efforts and identifies additional areas for improvement in making a comprehensive, accessible network for students to walk and bike to their school.


#### Typical mode of school arrival and departure by distance child lives from school













President Cowgill called the meeting to order and led those present in the Pledge of Allegiance.

MAYOR'S REPORT: Mayor Orr presented the following requests:

AUDIENCE: Tom Davey, representing Dickens Victorian Village. He stated that this is the 16<sup>th</sup> year and it has been very successful and is everything it is intended to be. He thanked the City, in particular, Tom Lanning and his crew for the assistance given to them over the years. He stated that the reason he is here tonight is that they need a new home, the owner of their current location at 647 Wheeling Ave. is owned by the Democratic Party and they were very up front with them in the beginning that they wanted to rent it for 2 or 3 years until they could pay off their mortgage and then they wanted it back. That has happened – they have notified them that they need to vacate by July 1. He stated that they need to be on Wheeling Ave., they need to be handicapped accessible and it needs to be affordable. This is the 3<sup>rd</sup> location that they've had. The first location was where the tattoo parlor is, then they moved to the Gomber House, which was a great structure, people enjoyed seeing it, but it was off the beaten path so they didn't get the foot traffic and it was not handicapped accessible, they also had extra utility bills, lawn care maintenance and snow removal, so they moved back to Wheeling Ave., which works out much better for them. It's been a very successful project for the City. He stated that they have looked at a couple of locations, but they just aren't working out for them. They've also heard that there are a couple of beauty shops on Wheeling Ave. that might be available, they have also talked with Norm Blanchard to see what he might come up with. He stated that they may also think about a permanent home if the price is right and they can swing it. He stated that it's good for Cambridge but not good for them is the fact that there aren't as many choices as there once was, he stated that since early summer, there are 5 new retailers downtown. That has taken some spaces that might have been available to them. He stated that he didn't know if there is a Committee of Council that might help. President Cowgill stated that this isn't really something the Council would do, however, he is glad that they came to make them aware of the need. He asked the Councilmembers to be sure to pass along any information that they might know of, to pass that on to Tom. He also suggested to Tom and he meet with the Administration to see if they could come up with any ideas for space. Councilman Wolverton asked Davey if they have reached out to Doug Hartley or anyone from the Hartley Corporation as they might have some space. The Mayor stated we are a victim of our own success right now. It's absolutely beautiful in our downtown. He stated that the handicapped access is key, we have the space downstairs for the City Band and the Main Street but there won't be enough room to add another one.

Teresa Sestina, 2101Greenwood Ave. She stated that there is an Ordinance that limits the use of golf carts from Memorial Day to Labor Day. She stated that is not a whole lot of time and the only reason she is using the golf cart is, no gas – gas has gotten so high. She asked if someone would consider expanding the time on the usage of the golf carts. She stated it is for personal use but she would like to see if this Ordinance can be changed. Administrators and parents of students at the Cambridge City Schools are joining together to improve safety and encourage more students to walk and bicycle to school. By implementing the Safe Routes to School Travel Plan, Cambridge City Schools' goals are:

- To enable and encourage children, including those with disabilities, to walk and bicycle to school.
- To make bicycling and walking to school a safer and more appealing transportation alternative, thereby encouraging a healthy and active lifestyle from an early age.
- To facilitate the planning, development and implementation of projects and activities that will improve safety and reduce traffic, fuel consumption, and air pollution in the vicinity of our school.

This plan and the implementation thereof are consistent with the goals and strategies of the Long-Range Transportation and Development Plan for the Ohio Mid-Eastern Governments Association (OMEGA). OMEGA is the Regional Transportation Planning Organization that serves eight counties in eastern Appalachian Ohio to include Guernsey County.

As Executive Director of OMEGA, I am fully supportive of the Cambridge City Schools Safe Routes to School Travel Plan and program, and pledge to support the efforts of the School District and the City of Cambridge and to provide resources as appropriate.

# APPENDIX H – TRANSPORTATION POLICY

#### District Bus Policies (for all schools)

#### Policy: 8600–Transportation

It is the policy of the Board of Education to provide transportation for those students whose distance from their school makes this service necessary within the limitations established by State law. Such laws and rules shall govern any question not covered by this policy.

School buses shall be purchased, housed, and maintained by the Board for the transportation of resident students between their home areas and the schools of the District to which they are assigned or to their nonpublic or community schools. The Superintendent may substitute smaller buses for reasons of economy or efficiency of operation.

Children living beyond the following walking limits shall be entitled to bus transportation:

- A. Grades K through 5 1.5 mile
- B. Grades 6 through 12 1.5 mile

Exceptions to the foregoing limits may be made in the case of a temporarily or permanently disabled child who has been so certified by a physician and in the case of adverse safety conditions.

Transportation of eligible vocational or special education children between their home areas and schools outside the District shall be arranged through the use of Board-owned vehicles, through cooperation with other districts, through commercial carriers, and/or by other means in the most efficient and economical manner. The governing authority of a community school shall provide or arrange for transportation free of charge for any eligible special education student enrolled in the community school for whom the student's individualized education program specifies transportation.

Transportation to and from school shall be provided for each student residing in the District and attending a State-chartered nonpublic school that is located within the thirty (30) minute travel limitation established by State law on the same basis as established for resident students as set forth above. Chartered nonpublic school students who are transported by the Board may be assigned to ride on buses upon which resident students are also assigned.

Furthermore, transportation to and from school shall be provided for each native student (i.e., student entitled to attend school in the District under R.C. 3313.64 or 3313.65) attending an approved community school. However, if that community school is located outside the District, transportation will only be provided consistent with the thirty (30) minute travel limitation established by State law. Native students attending an approved community school located within the District will be provided transportation on the same basis as established for resident students set forth above. Students transported to an approved community school may be assigned to ride on buses upon which resident students are also assigned.

Transportation of eligible nonpublic or community school children between their home areas and schools shall be arranged through the use of District-owned vehicles, through cooperation with other districts, through commercial carriers, and/or by other means in the most efficient and economical manner. However, if the Board determines that said transportation is impracticable, then the parent(s) shall be provided payment-in-lieu of transportation at the amount established by State law, unless otherwise directed by action of the State Board of Education.

The Board will not be required to provide transportation for any native student enrolled in a community school if the Board has entered into an agreement with the governing authority of the

community school that designates the community school as responsible for providing or arranging the transportation of the District's native students to and from the community school and is certified by the State Board of Education as having met certain requirements established by State law. The governing authority of a community school must provide or arrange for transportation in a manner that is comparable to the transportation that the District provides or arranges for its native students of the same grade level and distance from school who are enrolled in the District. Also, the governing authority must provide or arrange for the transportation under such agreement free of charge for each of its enrolled students who are eligible to be transported in accordance with R.C. 3327.01 or who would otherwise be transported by the District under the District's transportation policy. If the Board enters into an agreement with the governing authority regarding the transportation of the District's native students, the State Board of Education shall make payments to the community school in accordance with the terms of the agreement for each student actually transported.

Likewise, the Board will not be responsible for providing transportation for any native student enrolled in an approved community school if the governing authority of the community school submits a written notification to the Board, by a date prescribed by the State Board of Education, stating that the governing authority will accept responsibility for providing or arranging for the transportation of the District's native students to and from the community school. The governing authority's unilateral acceptance of the responsibility to provide transportation must cover the entire school year and shall remain in effect for subsequent school years unless the governing authority submits written notification to the Board relinquishing the transportation responsibility. However, the governing authority cannot relinquish the transportation responsibility before the end of the school year and shall submit such notice by a date prescribed by the State Board of Education in order to allow the District a reasonable period of time to prepare for the transportation of its native students enrolled in the community school. If the governing authority unilaterally accepts the transportation responsibility, the State Board of Education shall make payments to the community school for each student actually transported calculated in accordance with existing State law governing the calculation of transportation payments to the District from the State and any rules implemented by the State Board of Education and that otherwise would be paid to the District.

Bus routes shall be established so that an authorized bus stop is available within reasonable walking distance of the home of every transported resident student. The Board shall approve the bus routes annually. The Superintendent is authorized to make any necessary changes in the approved route and shall inform the Board at the next regular meeting.

The Board authorizes the installation and use of video recording devices in the school buses to assist the drivers in providing for the safety and well-being of the students while on a bus.

Students meeting the Federal definition of "homeless" will be transported from their temporary place of residence to their school of assignment, at the request of the parent, guardian, or unaccompanied minor, to the same extent as all other students of the District and consistent with this Policy. If the homeless student's temporary residence is located outside the boundaries of the District, the Liaison for Homeless Children will coordinate with the Director of Transportation to contact the district in which the student temporarily resides to arrange for joint transportation of the student and to seek inter-district agreement on a method for apportioning the cost of such joint transportation. In no event will a homeless student be denied enrollment based on issues related to student transportation.

The Superintendent shall be responsible for developing and implementing appropriate administrative guidelines for this policy.

#### How it affects student travel modes:

Most transportation outside of the typical walking/bicycling radius (0.5 - 1 mile) is provided by the school district with buses. Within the 1-1.5-mile radius, this may be supplemented by parental/caregiver transportation. There is no policy in place discouraging walking or bicycling to school.

#### **School Travel Policies**

#### Policy: 5514 - Use of Bicycles

The Board of Education regards the use of bicycles for travel to and from school by students as an assumption of responsibility on the part of those students -- a responsibility in the care of property, in the observation of safety rules, and in the display of courtesy and consideration toward others.

The Board will permit the use of bicycles by students in accordance with the administrative guidelines of the Superintendent.

The Board will not be responsible for bicycles which are lost, stolen, or damaged.

#### How it affects student travel modes:

Bicycle travel is not discouraged. Liability is held by the student, though, which may incentivize the use of bike racks and locks.
